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## Milwaukee Partnerships Lead the Way to Growing a Diverse Mountain Biking Community

Mountain biking is one of the fastest growing recreation activities across the country. But with no mountain biking trails in the city, Milwaukee residents have limited opportunities for learning how to ride. Add to that the cost of the sport — bikes, helmets, shoes, protective gear and other equipment — and mountain biking quickly becomes inaccessible for many Milwaukeeans.

Efforts are taking shape to get more people into mountain biking. A key to making these efforts successful is building partnerships. In Milwaukee County, several groups are collaborating and reaching out beyond Wisconsin's borders to overcome these barriers.

In 2023, [Milwaukee Urban Trail Connections](#), a mountain biking trail group, and [Wheel & Sprocket](#), a Wisconsin-based bike retailer, partnered on a weekend event to bring underrepresented mountain bikers together in Wisconsin. With support from [Trek Bicycles](#) and the national organization [Minority Mountain Bikers](#), the Ride, Rally & Race Week came to southeastern Wisconsin in July 2023.

The event drew bikers from Wisconsin and all over the country to experience Wisconsin's mountain bike scene. Activities included a tour of the Trek World Headquarters in Waterloo, group rides at the John Muir Trails at the Kettle Moraine State Forest – Southern Unit and an invitation to participate in the Red Barn Classic race of the [Wisconsin Off-Road Series](#) (WORS).

As part of the weekend, the Boys & Girls Club of Greater Milwaukee brought high school youth out to the John Muir Trails. They were provided with bikes and helmets from Wheel & Sprocket. Jed Olson from [ORA \(Outdoor Recreation Alliance\) Trails](#) led a skills clinic before they hit the trails on their own. Riders from the Minority Mountain Bikers group rode along with the students, mentoring and providing representation that made these young riders feel comfortable, welcomed and empowered.

Introducing kids to mountain biking in a fun, positive setting, drawing people from all over the country to experience Wisconsin and the WORS series and creating a strong community of people passionate about growing and diversifying mountain biking are just a few partnership successes from 2023.

Looking at 2024 and beyond, the vision of organizer Ken Cole is a two-pronged approach: 1) build on the inaugural event's success for another, bigger gathering with Minority Mountain Bikers to strengthen the mountain bike community *and* 2) leverage the growing interest in mountain biking to build more trails in the city of Milwaukee. He hopes by expanding the mountain biking community and connecting existing trails across the city will make mountain biking accessible to everyone.
