Not Horsing Around: The Dollars and Cents of Wisconsin's Equestrian Community

Equestrian sports have roots that predate modern technology. They allow people to connect with animals and nature. These activities quietly thrum through Wisconsin's economy, resulting in a \$134 million industry in 2023, up from \$87 million in 2012. Nationally, Wisconsin ranked 19th for growth in equestrian recreation activities; across the country, equestrian activities accounted for \$7.2 billion of the nation's gross domestic product.

In Wisconsin, the equine industry encompasses manufacturers, retailers, guides, lodging, education, stables and much more – including events like the [Midwest Horse Fair](#).

Since 1979, the Wisconsin Horse Council has welcomed thousands of equestrian aficionados from across the country to Madison for the annual Midwest Horse Fair, held this year from April 11-13. Owned by the Wisconsin Horse Council, the Fair promotes Wisconsin's equine industry through leadership, education, service, communication and future growth and development.

The Fair has a little bit of everything for its 62,000 attendees: 400-plus exhibitors, a rodeo, clinics, demonstrations, shopping and networking. It even includes career exploration components, including the Wisconsin FFA State Horse Evaluation Career Development Event, a competition to advance to the National FFA Convention. In 2024, the Fair broke its Friday attendance record, welcoming an Alliant Energy Center record 23,000 visitors to its first day.

With an estimated \$11 million in economic impact on the Madison area in 2023, event organizers say, "The Midwest Horse Fair may be Madison's best-kept secret, but we are the horse world's best destination." But the Fair isn't the only way the equine industry contributes to Wisconsin's economy and culture.



Whether by two wheels or four legs, there are lots of ways to explore Wisconsin! Dan Wegmueller offers visitors guided trail rides and lessons at [Wegmueller Farm](#) in Monroe - and helps orient gravel cyclists to the countryside.

Equine Businesses Make Hay for Wisconsin

From products to services, businesses catering to horse lovers can be found across Wisconsin. [Evolutionary Saddles](#) specializes in custom-built saddles designed to fit the rider and the horses they ride. Today, Evolutionary Saddles is located in Stratford, but Lara Kronberger moved the business from Minnesota when she bought it. Kronberger and her apprentice make

12 models of Western and English saddles for a variety of disciplines, each designed for rider and horse. Bridles, cinches and other accessories are also handmade by Evolutionary Saddles.

Opened in 2002, [Impact Gel](#) saddle pads are fun, functional and handcrafted equipment for equestrians. The office, product development and manufacturing facility for Impact Gel are all located in Trempealeau County. Impact Gel pads use a patented material made of interconnected, energy-dissipating molecules that absorb and disperse the force of impact from horse saddles. Products are available for sale online, through authorized dealers and now available for shipping to Canada.

The [Elkhorn Equestrian Event Center](#) is one of a handful of private nonprofit fairgrounds in the country. Located on 90 acres, it is part of the Walworth County Fairgrounds. Its five horse arenas, permanent stalls, horse track and 500 campsites (with hookups) have made it one of the largest equestrian event centers in the Midwest!

Equestrian Tourism

From north to south and all points in between, stables dot Wisconsin's landscape, offering boarding, lessons, guided tours and other ways to experience horseback riding.

The English style of horseback riding has led to an increase in the "[riding tourism market size](#)," valued at \$1.8 billion globally in 2024 and projected to reach \$3.5 billion by 2033. The same report cited U.S. Forest Service statistics that approximated 3.8 million individuals participated in equestrian tourism in 2023. Global trends see adventure travel as a driver for the increase in equestrian tourism.

Also contributing to the growth in riding tourism is endurance riding, a specific type of competitive riding where riders and horses travel 50-100 miles a day in a long-distance race. In 2025, almost [20 endurance rides](#) are already planned across Wisconsin on public and private lands. These rides bring out support crews and spectators for two or three days of riding.

As travelers are looking for experiential activities in nature, Wisconsin's rural communities and existing infrastructure provide growth opportunities for equestrian tourism.

For the traveling equestrian, Wisconsin is home to several facilities offering horseback riding opportunities for visitors of all riding levels. [Spur of the Moment Ranch](#), in Mountain, allows visitors to bring their horses with them or to experience horseback riding with trained staff. [Woodside Ranch Resort and Conference Center](#) offers horseback riding and wagon ride experiences for guests. Located in rural Mauston, the ranch sits on 1,000 acres with optional guided and private horseback rides available.

Many of Wisconsin's state parks are open to horseback riding. In fact, the Wisconsin state park system offers over 700 miles of equestrian trails, with 175 campsites where visitors can camp with their horses.

Development Efforts, Resources and Opportunities

To support and enhance equestrian facilities at state parks and forests, the [Equestrian Friends of Governor Knowles State Forest](#), [Friends of Governor Dodge State Park Equestrians](#), [Northern Kettle Moraine Horse Trail Association](#) and [Southern Kettle Moraine Horse Trail Association](#) raise funds, undertake projects, provide community and learning opportunities and support equestrian facilities at state properties. These groups help ensure equestrian campgrounds and trails have appropriate facilities and infrastructure for horse riders and their horses. The fundraising provided by these groups contributes hundreds of thousands of dollars in improvements to expand recreational access while providing community and fellowship for participants.

Working alongside friends groups, and in addition to organizing the Midwest Horse Fair, the [Wisconsin Horse Council](#) awards sponsorships and trail grants to help equine charity events and clubs, mentors young horse people, initiates new programs, provides leadership and promotion of horses, conducts educational seminars and clinics and sponsors an annual four-day Trail Design School focused on designing and building recreational trails for horseback riding.

Horse trails and campgrounds are not built the same as hiking trails or for tent campsites and should be developed sensitive to the needs of riders and horses. The [U.S. Forest Service Equestrian Design Guidebook](#) offers instructions, steps, funding sources and examples for trail planners, architects, engineers, land managers and developers focused on recreational horseback riding. The guidebook shares important tips and reminders about the needs of horses and the required infrastructure for overnight horse comfort and safety, including corrals, trailer-sized parking areas, tether poles, box stalls, drinking water and more.

While the percentage of Wisconsinites who participate in horseback riding may be small (5%), the opportunity for growth is large. The [2025-2030 Statewide Comprehensive Outdoor Recreation Plan](#) received recommendations for more horseback riding opportunities, and with the industry growing, events like the Midwest Horse Fair and endurance races can introduce the activity to new participants and draw visitors from afar to enjoy Wisconsin's equine offerings.
