"Lake Life" Fuels Wisconsin's Economy

When spoken, the expression "lake life" conjures thoughts of a warm, sunny day with friends or family relaxing and having fun aboard a boat in the middle of pristine water. The saying may well have emerged from Wisconsin, where 15,000 inland lakes attract many recreational boaters each summer. The state's major rivers and two Great Lakes add to the options.

Lake life isn't just an enjoyable activity, it's also one that plays a major role in Wisconsin's economy. Over half a million boats were registered in Wisconsin in 2020, the fifth most of any state or the third most per capita, according to registration data from the U.S. Coast Guard. The expenditures by boaters on gas, accessories and travel are just a drop in the bucket of boating's contributions to the state's gross domestic product (GDP). Wisconsin is home to several marine manufacturers that make and sell products and provide thousands of jobs for Wisconsinites.

An outgrowth of the early shipbuilding industry that flourished along the Great Lakes, recreational boating manufacturers anchored their businesses in Wisconsin. The abundant water bodies and skilled workforce continue to be an unbeatable combination. [Burger Boat Company](#) of Manitowoc, maker of luxury yachts, grew out of a shipyard and ship repair business that was started in 1863. The family-owned [Kahlenburg Industries](#), makers of propellers, started in 1895 and still exists in Two Rivers. In 1939, [Mercury Marine](#) was established in Fond du Lac, which employs over 4,000 people and estimates a [\\$5 billion economic impact](#) to the surrounding community. Another 600 are employed at [BRP's Marine headquarters](#) in Sturtevant (former home of Evinrude), 50 in Gillett by Northport Marine, makers of [MirroCraft](#) fishing boats and [Montego Bay](#) pontoons, while [Grand Craft](#) recently relocated to Genoa City from Michigan with plans to employ 20 people to make their custom mahogany boats.

Overall, recreational boating and fishing contributed over [\\$720 million to Wisconsin's GDP in 2020](#), a 51% increase from the previous year despite pandemic-related hurdles all manufacturers faced. The National Marine Manufacturers Association (NMMA) reports [the trend in first time boat buyers continued to increase in 2021](#), with optimism for another good year in 2022 as manufacturers are still working to fulfill the backlog of new orders.

While demand remains high still, innovations in boating technology are also dawning. Mercury Marine recently announced its new [Avator electric outboard motor](#) which is set to be released later this year and in early 2023. The electric motor concept delivers on the company's sustainability goals and is an effort to making boating more accessible.

Other initiatives designed to make boating more accessible and introduce a wider audience to the activity are just as promising. The [Freedom Boat Club](#), which provides education and safety training and access to boat rentals for members, is expanding by

adding five new Wisconsin locations this year. One previously existed at Milwaukee's McKinley Marina, and the others will be on the Milwaukee River, in Racine, Oshkosh, Green Lake and Madison. NMMA and the Marine Retailers Association of the Americas (MRAA) launched their '[See You Out Here](#)' campaign to be a year-round affair welcoming boaters from all backgrounds to experience the water, and Mercury Marine is inviting current boaters to bring a friend along for the ride during its '[Take a Friend Boating Weekend](#)' this July 15-17.

Putting Summer Safety First

Wear it, Wisconsin. That's the message from Wisconsin's Department of Natural Resources about boating and water safety, and is just one of the simple safety reminders the industry can help amplify this summer. Recreating safely and responsibly fosters positive experiences along with an opportunity to come back and do it again. Whether interacting with a novice or an experienced outdoorist, include safety messaging in any sales pitch or trip orientation.

Here are a few resources to consult when creating your own safety materials or for sharing through your channels to help spread the word.

Boating/Paddling/Swimming

Wearing a personal floatation device, and wearing one that fits appropriately, are outlined here in these [tips](#) from the Wisconsin DNR, and this [video](#) from the Water Sports Foundation illustrates the various styles and what to look for in appropriate fit.

[Special considerations for recreating on flowing water](#) are the topic of constant education due to sandbar drop offs and dangerous currents. Recreational Boating Facilities Grant

Funding is available to counties, local governments, sanitary districts, public inland lake protection and rehabilitation districts and qualified lake associations for recreational boating facility projects including ramps and service docks, weed harvesting, dredging and navigational aids. Next application deadline is September 1. [Learn more.](#)

Trail Accelerator Grant

The program provides awardees with professional trail planning and consultation services to launch their trail development efforts, which can often leverage additional investment from local, regional and national partners. Applications due July 31. [Learn more.](#)

BFGoodrich Tires Outstanding Trails Grant

Funds are available to help organize clean-ups, trail maintenance workdays and other small stewardship projects. The average grant is under \$500 and can be used for everything from feeding volunteers to purchasing equipment, trash bags and tools. Next application deadline is September 30. [Learn more.](#)

Joint Effort Marketing (JEM) Grant Deadline August 1, November 1

The Department of Tourism's reimbursement grant for nonprofits provides funding to make a promotion or event come to fruition. Five different categories of projects can be
